The Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) word for January is COOPERATION.

COOPERATION is when people and groups work together to achieve a common goal. Vince Lombardi put it best when he said, "People who work together will win, whether it be against complex football defenses, or the problems of modern society."

Learning to cooperate means that a person can think about and balance their own wants and needs with another person's wants and needs. When it comes to adult and children relationships, many people think that cooperation means the child does what the adult wants. However, that is compliance not cooperation. True cooperation means a joint effort - a give and take between the adult and the child. The end result being something they both agree on and find mutually satisfying.

Here are a couple of ideas on how you can teach cooperation to children. Do chores together such as setting the table, cleaning up the toys, putting away the laundry or doing the dishes. Point out why and how their contribution is important. Offer suggestions, not commands. For example, "It's cold outside so you're going to need a hat. Would you like help putting it on or do you want to do it yourself?' Give your child choices while maintaining the rules. For example, "Teeth need to be brushed at bedtime. Do you want to do it before or after we read books?" Offering choices shows your child respect.

In life, we soon realize that we can't do life alone. Simply put, we're going to need to work with people our entire lives. Whether that be on school projects, sports teams, in our careers, and yes, even making our houses into homes. We need people who we can trust to help us complete the tasks bigger than ourselves.

Spencer loses district chiefs

DiUlio, Colletti retire as lifetime educators

SPENCER — Spencer public schools have lost their right and left hands this summer.

One of the hands is Administrator James DiUlio, while the other is Joseph Colletti, principal of Spencer High School

High School.

DiUlio, 62, announced last September he would be leaving June 30 after serving the district for 15 years. Before that, he was a teacher in Shell Lake and a teacher and supervising principal in Birchwood.


Colletti also has wrapped up a 34year career in education that took him from his hometown of Madison to the fast-paced California lifestyle, and finally to what he called the peaceful, quiet life in Spencer.

But that serenity doesn't mean Colletti wasn't kept busy. In Spencer, the high school principal also served as athletic director, a dual role that's been split up in most other schools in the Marawood Conference.

"Oftentimes work starts at 7:30 a.m. and if it's a board meeting night or a ballgame, it goes until 10:30 or 11 p.m.," he said. Colletti often found himself occupied with school matters four nights a week, whether at school or at home.

So when the state passed a new law providing full retirement benefits for public employees retiring at age 62, he made his decision.

"I said — after 34 years — I think I'll wrap it up," he said. Although he's only 61, he qualified for retire-

ment this year because of the school district's fiscal year calendar.

Spencer schools under DiUlio and Colletti stressed the basics, Colletti said, while still keeping up to date with computer systems.

DiUlio said the district started early childhood, learning disabilities, and educational TV programs and built a new shop during his tenure.

Although Spencer is a predominantly agricultural area, student interest in agriculture has lagged, Colletti said. Many graduates have chosen to take jobs at the Land O' Lakes cheese factory, at Artcraft Mobile Homes, or at several industries in nearby Marshfield.

Colletti is proud that Spencer has maintained relatively low turnover among teachers, something small districts often have problems with.

But DiUlio said that in recent years relations between teachers and administrators have suffered. Contract negotiations with teachers was one aspect of the job he disliked, DiUlio said.

He said he's still glad he decided to be an educator. "You know you're in a worthwhile business. You see others succeed. It's a good feeling to see learning take place and, of course, that's the thing that's the highlight of the whole process — seeing success."

As principal of a school with only 285 students in grades 9-12, Colletti found he had to do it all, taking attendance and monitoring hallways. Discipline accounted for much of his time.

"Discipline isn't a problem. You know them all, and there's not the numbers of a big school. But I've gotten my share of eggs thrown at my house, and verbal abuse by phone," he said

"It's to be taken in stride. Maybe it's a sign that you're doing your job. Principals talk about it when we get together."

He believes there is a bit less respect for principals and teachers than when he was in school. At least, the disrespectful seem more vocal, perhaps because of greater permissiveness by parents, he said.

While DiUlio plans to stay in Spencer for awhile, Colletti's house is for sale, and he plans to return to Madison after helping out the new principal, John Hiltunen.

Pon Draeger, as he is often wont to do, sent me this article from the Spencer Historical Society a few weeks ago. I glanced at it. Mr. Di Ulio was the superintendent when I was a kid and Mr. Colletti, as principal ,tried to bar me from a baseball game when I was a junior for being tardy. I figured that was a little harsh. I believe the word insubordination was bandied about. I coulda spelled that if I had to. I was always a pretty good speller. I digress. Anyhow, I figured I'd put it on the shelf for a while and see if I could use it down the line. Then I noticed the date.

July 6, 1984.

What a rush! 44 days earlier on May 23 a friend and I started a drive to Fairbanks, Alaska. On May 28, we arrived. Roughly 3 months later I was thrust in front of a high school classroom filled with Inupiaq Eskimo in the NW coastal village of Kivalina, AK.

There's a few times in your life when it's either sink or swim. This was one of those moments.

Over the course of the next few months I had to conjure up the past to stay a step ahead.

I had plenty of good role models on which to draw. Mrs. Rannow, H.S. English, immediately came to mind. Mr. Sautner, Science. My brother Bob, English and Sociology and as a coach. Mr. Stewart, P.E. and baseball.

Then there was the not-to-do list, like the un-named (yes, I do still know it) English 9 teacher who ran screaming from the classroom when Eugene Heisler dragged a rubber snake, complete with fishing-line-dragger, across her desk. That same teacher decided it was a great idea to re-do the seating chart so all the girls were on one side of the room and all the boys on the other. It wasn't. And the school counselor at the time (yes, I remember that name as well) who suggested I go to trade school because my grades weren't good enough for college. That same person didn't remember me when I went back 4 years later with a college degree in my pocket. Yes, I digress, again.

To be honest, I kinda dismissed this article a bit, maybe because Mr. Colletti tried to bar me from a baseball game for being tardy. Then I thought Mr. DiUlio and Mr. Colletti were regular dudes, just like I turned out to be. They had families. We went to school with their kids. They had to make hard decisions with kids just like I had to when I was in their shoes. And now that they're gone I think it's only right to say thanks Jim and Joe. It worked out alright.
