his Fall, Earth Incorporated made tremendous strides in the completion of the new Village subdivision. With the mild weather, they were able to work until December 18th. At this time all water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer pipes and structures are in the ground. The North and South retaining ponds have been constructed. Base aggregate has been installed for



the streets, and site grading is 90% complete.

Earth Inc. plans to come back as early as possible next rink so it can be used at night as well. Through everyany final preparations to the base aggregate that was

installed in December, followed by the pouring of curb and gutter by the first week of May. Asphalt paving and final site restoration are to be completed after that.

Housing construction will begin late this Spring and lots are currently for sale through the Village. Single family lots run from \$12,000 to \$15,000 and multi-family lots run from \$12,000 to \$27,000. The Village is also currently negotiating with some larger developers to build larger scale multi-family apartments in the subdivision.



And yes we are far from polished. Far from pristine. But that doesn't mean we are striving to form a union that is perfect. And so we lift our gazes not to what stands between us, but what stands before us. We close the divide because we know, to put our future first, we must first put our differences aside. 
