

What's Rockin' in Rocketville!

By Mike Endreas District Admin./School District of Spencer You know you have big news when Steve Pilz, Editor in Chief of the Village Voice is willing to hold a space open in the upcoming edition. Arguably, the biggest event to hit our area in some time has finally come to fruition. Grant notification from FEMA has

been received and the Village of Spencer will be receiving over \$2.9 million dollars for the community safe shelter.

If you recall, last year, which honestly seems to be much longer than that, the School District of Spencer went to referendum for \$5.98 million for upgrades to the building along with a gymnasium and fitness center that would double as a community safe shelter. A FEMA pre-disaster mitigation grant was written by Jordan Buss which, if awarded ,would offset the referendum costs. Our original timeline as told to us by FEMA would be grant allocation

to come out in December and our expectation was to be funded in the \$2 - \$2.4 million dollar range. Well, it must be true, they say good things come to those who wait and we received the maximum we applied for.

Up until this point my standard response as to how that Dome is coming was, "we are waiting on funding." Well, the wait is over and we have a tentative schedule planned for construction. We have completed the Elementary office move and renovation. The FACE room and bathroom renovation is scheduled to begin on June 1 and will be completed by the start of the upcoming school year. Excavation and site prep for the Dome and conventional additions to our building will begin late June or July with the Dome construction to begin on or around August 1st. The building is then geared to be ready to open for the 2021-22 school year.

As a District we are excited to be able to support the community through a partnership with the Village by having a tornado safe shelter for our citizens that will also double as a community fitness center. Our students will benefit by having up-graded classrooms and gymnasium facilities that will allow more offerings.

Due to the out of the box thinking of Jordan Buss and the willingness of our Board of Education to be willing to take a calculated risk, we are creating a structure that can only improve the attraction of young families and others to the Spencer community. Spencer is a great place to live and to raise a family and the community supported improvements make that statement a reality.

There were a lot of different ways to go in announcing that Spencer was granted a

boat-load of money from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) halfway through May. But I decided that it was only fitting that I let Spencer School District Administer Mike Endreas announce it in his monthly article above.

Fittingly, he was quick to thank the Board of Education and board member Jordan Buss ,who wrote the grant, the Village of Spencer for their support and role in the process and the folks of Spencer, dubbing Spencer "a great place to live and raise a family." All true.

But perhaps equally important in letting Mike bat lead-off was that he mentioned my name in the first sentence. Much like a FEMA grant; that don't happen every day. (See CONGRATULATIONS on page 3.)

I originally wanted to title this piece <u>\$2,926,153.00</u> but I didn't want to jinx us. Why \$2,926,153.00? That's the exact amount of the FEMA grant. Endreas said the final award amount was really good news. "We were hoping for somewhere between \$2 and \$2.4 million. We were always working on the conservative, low-end range."

What that means is that the grant will cover a whopping 90% of the new construction with taxpayers covering the other \$325,128, a virtual pittance for a project of this magnitude.


The fact that taxpayers voted 57% in favor of the project a little over two years ago shows the overall need and the fact that we are progressing as a village and a school district. Again, all good news. The grant is indeed icing on the cake.

Since the dome is designed to withstand tornadic wind it qualified for the FEMA grant. Voters in 2019 knew that the grant wasn't a given and still passed the referendum handily.

The Village and School district had been eagerly awaiting FEMA's decision and in June of 2019 the grant was approved, just not the amount. Good news but the waiting continued. I would say the ultimate amount made the waiting worthwhile.

Endreas said the delays have pushed things back about six months. "We originally wanted the dome ready to go this January but now it will open for the 2021-22 school year."

"The higher amount of the grant will now allow us to do



some things that we previously couldn't have done, not to mention it will help lower taxpayer costs."

Endreas continued, "It's difficult to predict the exact eventual impact on taxes but there will be a tax break for our taxpayers because of the higher grant award. There's a lot of factors so I don't think the tax impact will be felt until 2020-21."

Another boon to the overall project coincided with the dropping of interest rates.

The outlook wasn't brilliant for the Mudville nine that day; the score stood four to two, with but one inning more to play. And then when Cooney died at first, and Barrows did the same, a sickly silence fell upon the patrons of the game.

A straggling few got up to go in deep despair. The rest clung to that hope which springs eternal in the human breast; they thought, if only Casey could get but a whack at that – they'd put up even money, now, with Casey at the bat.

But Flynn preceded Casey, as did also Jimmy Blake, and the former was a lulu and the latter was a cake, so upon that stricken multitude grim melancholy sat, for there seemed but little chance of Casey's getting to the bat.

But Flynn let drive a single, to the wonderment of all, and Blake, the much despised, tore the cover off the ball; and when the dust had lifted, and the men saw what had occurred, there was Jimmy safe at second and Flynn a-hugging third.

Then from five thousand throats and more there rose a lusty yell; it rumbled through the valley, it rattled in the dell; it knocked upon the mountain and recoiled upon the flat, for Casey, mighty Casey, was advancing to the bat.

There was ease in Casey's manner as he stepped into his place; there was pride in Casey's bearing and a smile on Casey's face. And when, responding to the cheers, he lightly doffed his hat, no stranger in the crowd could doubt 'twas Casey at the bat.

Ten thousand eyes were on him as he rubbed his hands with dirt; five thousand tongues applauded when he wiped them on his shirt. Then while the writhing pitcher ground the ball into his hip, defiance gleamed in Casey's eye, a sneer curled Casey's lip.

And now the leather-covered sphere came hurtling through the air, and Casey stood a-watching it in haughty grandeur there. Close by the sturdy batsman the ball unheeded sped— "That ain't my style," said Casey. "Strike one," the umpire said.

From the benches, black with people, there went up a muffled roar, like the beating of the storm-waves on a stern and distant shore. "Kill him! Kill the umpire!" shouted someone on the stand; and it's likely they'd have killed him had not Casey raised his hand.

With a smile of Christian charity great Casey's visage shone; he stilled the rising tumult; he bade the game go on; he signaled to the pitcher, and once more the spheroid flew; but Casey still ignored it, and the umpire said: "Strike two."

"Fraud!" cried the maddened thousands, and Echo answered fraud; but one scornful look from Casey and the audience was awed. They saw his face grow stern and cold, they saw his muscles strain, and they knew that Casey wouldn't let that ball go by again.

The sneer is gone from Casey's lip, his teeth are clenched in hate; he pounds with cruel violence his bat upon the plate. And now the pitcher holds the ball, and now he lets it go, and now the air is shattered by the force of Casey's blow.

Oh, somewhere in this favored land the sun is shining bright; the band is playing somewhere, and somewhere hearts are light, and somewhere men are laughing, and somewhere children shout; but there is no joy in Mudville — mighty Casey has struck out

Not LTCA, 400 N School St, Spencer WI 54479 • lucilletackto say they're gone for good - absolutely NOT! However, seating will need to be adjusted for a "new normal," at least for this season. Whittle those 501 down to allow for a safe space between patrons, and we're likely to be at less than 200 available spaces.

Then, take the expenses of producing live performances (artist fees, hotel rooms, meals, transportation, sound production, advertising and NOW cleaning, disinfecting and related covid costs) and divide by a much lower number of potential seats. Offering a reasonably priced ticket and breaking even on a show just became significantly much more difficult.

Theatres and concert venues across the country were among the first places to close their doors back in March due to public health concerns and, without a doubt, will be among the last to reopen. Here at the Tack, our annual fundraising gala had to be cancelled, and ticket revenue ceased even though three of our last four shows were headed for a "full house." In addition, the anticipated expense of doing what it takes to make the theatre safe and comfortable is substantial.

During these challenging days, we realize that many are finding it hard to care for their families and pay their bills. Yet others, having spent less in the past few months, find themselves with a little extra. If you are fortunate enough to be in the second group, we ask that you give some thought to participating in our one-time "Full House Fundraiser." Together, let's "sell" 501 seats at \$25 each over 25 days. Hopefully, we can "fill the house!" If you usually attend a show with a friend, maybe you would donate \$50. Endreas concluded, "The school's financial advisor said the final 1.71% was the lowest rate she had ever seen on this type of borrowing. It was a perfect storm for the district and the tax payers being able to get the most out of the FEMA grant while also getting the lowest interest rate."

While congratulations and thanks should certainly go mostly to the school district, the school board, the village government and myriad folks I'm missing, I'll stick with CONGRATULATIONS SPENCER because it was the past Rockets and the parents of the present and future Rockets that made this happen.
