Learn to honor traditions and learn about others' traditions. Talk about differences respectfully and about how it's good that people are different.

SCB Update:

Spencer Community Boosters continues to provide valuable programs to the Spencer Community. Since inception in 2015 we have been dedicated to the community and youth sports. Currently Spencer Community Boosters runs the Youth Baseball, Softball, and Basketball Programs. In addition, we are working towards beginning a youth volleyball program. These programs are critical to our small area and allow kids to play where they live instead of traveling to neighboring towns. Each year over 125 Spencer kids participate in our programs and over 100 kids from outside of Spencer come to the ARC Park to play ball.



Since 2016 SCB has been running the Spencer ARC park. We host several tournaments, including the Brad Bauer Community Tourney. In addition, three nights a week you'll be able to watch youth baseball and Thursday our Adult League night hosts Volleyball and Men's Softball. Monday through Thursday you will find anywhere between 50 and 200 people in the stands. It's a busy place which is amazing because the years' prior had seen a steep decline in attendance as the ARC Park fell into disrepair.

SCB wanted to change that and we did! As the years passed, we made many enhancements to the park including new dugouts, electrical, replaced the walk in cooler. But with more use and an ever-mounting maintenance list, it has become evident that we need more. The concessions and shelter area are in need of major improvements and more to the point, do not meet our needs any longer. In 2019 SCB requested permission to build new facilities. The timeline for completion is dependent on fundraising but we are hoping to complete phase one in the fall of this year or Spring of 2021 as to not cause any down time with our leagues.

Phase one will include tear down and reconstruction of the shelter area. The new shelter will be better placed behind home plate and will include an announcing booth above the structure so that the scorekeeper can hear the umpires during games. Approximate cost of this phase of the project is \$30,000


Phase two will include tear down and reconstruction of the concession stand and storage area. The current concession stand has limited space and each year faces more and more maintenance needs. Some have been hundreds of dollars to fix and what's needed in the next few years would be too expensive to spend fixing on a building that doesn't suit our needs effectively. The Village of Spencer has given the go ahead to move forward on the reconstruction pending submission of the floor plans. The projected cost of this project is \$60,000. Currently SCB will

need additional fundraising to cover this cost but we are hoping for a great 2020 and 2021 season! Lets hope the current shut downs don't last into the summer. We are confident that with two years of regular season fundraising, along with community support, we will have no problem meeting this goal. FIRE, from page 5 Mayor W. H. Upham and a large number of the whole-souled citizens of Marshfield came up as soon as the fire would admit of it and brought with them two wagon loads of provisions which were divided among the needy who had been left.....

without food or shelter. Mayor Upham, in behalf of the citizens, invited all who were unprovided with shelter to accompany them to Marshfield. Nearly all were provided, however, having found a place with friends. Nevertheless, the kindly aid given and the hospitable invitation extended will not soon be forgotten by the people of Spencer.

The trains were somewhat delayed as the rails were badly warped where the fire passed. The telegraph wires were also down, but were soon repaired and an instrument placed in the Blackstone house.

We have interviewed some of our citizens who were burned out and in answer to the question, are you going to rebuild? The reply has been yes, in most instances. Many will not rebuild so long as the weather keeps as dry as it has been during the past season, but as soon as all is favorable we will expect to see buildings going up on the sites of those that are now smouldering in ruins.

The records of the town were saved.

The railroad company will rebuild the depot 250 feet north of where it formerly stood. For the time being a freight car will be employed as a freight room. The post office is located in the Hagen building.
