at the TACK The current pandemic has touched each of us in ways great and small. From minimized social interac-

tions and lack of toilet paper to unemployment and business failures, there is no end to the devastation this virus has inflicted. We would like to offer some insight into a sector, near and dear to our hearts, that has been adversely affected by the virus, but has yet to make the front page news.

The Wisconsin Policy Forum, an independent, nonpartisan statewide research and policy organization, recently released a report entitled Arts and Culture in a Pandemic: An Existential Threat, which paints a stark picture of the difficult scenario ahead for the creative sector—locally, regionally and statewide. This "creative sector" includes the industries of core creative fields (music, dance, heritage, live theatre experiences and visual arts); creative services (advertising, design, architecture, digital media); and producers of creative content (film and television production, broadcasting, book/magazine publishers, leisure software).

Before the pandemic, research from the US Department of Commerce showed that Wisconsin's creative sector provided a \$10.1 billion economic benefit and employed over 96,000 people (more jobs than the state's beer, biotech, and papermaking industries). The negative economic impact of the pandemic on for-profit and non-profit creative businesses in Wisconsin is currently over \$34 million, according to Americans for the Arts. Nationally, the impact is over \$877 billion. Over ¾ of Wisconsin's creative workforce is now unemployed; and these performers, artists, and other creative workers have no prospects for work in their profession for the foreseeable future.

Keep in mind that small venues and performing arts centers were the first to close and will be the last to re-open. Granted, they are not paying artist fees to performers, but non-profits still have bills for personnel, rent and utilities, ticketing software, insurance, and communications at a time when there is little or no income. These completely shuttered small businesses represent the industry hardest hit by the pandemic and are in dire need of support in order to survive until it is safe to reopen.

Unfortunately, closing stages impacts the entire live performance economy and ecosystem in cities and small towns across America. This includes artists, talent agents, stagehands, ushers, security, restaurants & concessions, artist managers, tour bus companies, production, radio/social media/tv/print advertising, record companies, and many others. In addition to the economy, the quality of life in our communities has been negatively affected by this difficult situation, especially for creative businesses and workers.

What's Rockin' in Rocketville!

e are all set to begin the school year on Tuesday, September 1st! I am extremely proud of the work our faculty and staff have put in to prepare for these unprecedented times. Our staff led the way for area schools last spring and I know they will be setting a high standard for the fall. Our main goal is to give kids opportunities while reducing risks.

We have decided administratively, under the direction of the Marathon County Health department, to start in what we refer to as our cohort model. In our elementary this has an impact on the day-to-day work of keeping our kids in small groups but it is face-to-face four days a week. We know we can accommodate our numbers keeping our kids socially distanced in those areas. We do struggle with this in our middle/high school. The size of classes and rooms do not allow us to assure the distancing requirement. Knowing this and also understanding the notion that with an outbreak we could be forced to go completely virtual, we have decided to ease into the school year. By bringing half the kids back two days a week and the other half getting live virtual we can keep the distancing rules in place. Albeit, not the most popular plan amongst some of our parents and community, we feel it is important to reduce risk for our kids.

As a district we have also decided to pursue our fall sports seasons. Now I know the first reaction is we are teaching virtually but allowing our kids to play sports. Our goal, as I mentioned before, is to reduce risk while giving kids opportunities. We are in two conferences: the Cloverbelt for volleyball and cross country and the Central Wisconsin Large for football. Both of those conferences have voted to attempt sports this fall. There is a spring option but we are concerned that if we do not attempt to go this fall we will not have anyone to play in the spring. As a district we are following all of the prescribed protocol to reduce risk and feel comfortable moving forward. See ROCKIN' page 7.


Spencer Library news....

Spencer Community Boosters President Becky Gorst contributed the following story.



The facilities have served the community for several decades but are showing their age. We have done many improvements over the years but maintenance needs are exceeding the point where it is more economical to re-build. Both buildings have needed new roofs due to water damage since we began working in them. Electrical work is not up to code and frequently fails. The walk-in cooler breaks down multiple times a year as the building was not built to house it in the first place.

The project will be done in two phases. Phase one will be to tear down the shelter area. It is built over the current concession stand and there is no way to save it if we want to increase the size of the stand. This Fall demolition will be completed and the shelter replaced with a 30x30 space, housing an announcing booth above. The new location will be behind home plate which will solve the issue of hearing umpires and seeing the field for score-book/scoreboard keepers

In 2021, we will rebuild the concession stand. The new concession stand will be built to code and be better designed to meet the new needs of the park. The stand will include better electrical, a hood-vent system, more bathroom stalls, and ultimately, a better layout to work the concession stand more efficiently.

Each year thousands of spectators utilize the park and the new facilities will make the ARC Park a favorite in the area. Area businesses will have an opportunity to help fund-raise for the building and Spencer Community Boosters is proud to announce we have our first donor. Spectrum Benefit Solutions has pledged \$10,000 towards the project and will have their name listed as a lifetime donor on the front of the building.



From the Editor Becky continued: "It's been a neglected park for a long time," said Gorst. "Somebody needed to do something with it."

SCB was established in 2016 and has been renting the ARC Park from the Village. "We run the youth softball, baseball and basketball programs so we just decided to (run the ARC Park)," Gorst continued.

"We host at least three tournaments or more per year including the Brad Bauer Memorial Tournament, youth baseball and softball tournaments. They help us raise money. At least 200 people filter through this park four days a week. A lot of people come on a regular basis."

"This year we're taking down the shelter and putting it behind home plate. It will make room for a new concession stand and we'll put it in a bigger building. The announcer's booth and shelter should be done very early in October and the electrical work in the Spring. We will be ready to do baseball in May. In 2021 the new concession stand will be built. We will never have a lapse in activity."

"We've been making investments all along. Once this is done we want to do the bleachers and volleyball courts. At the end of the day, we'll have a brand new facility down there. There's a lot of needs but the community has been very supportive," concluded Gorst.
