

Spencer's Hunter Luepke leads North Dakota State to FCS national title

FRISCO, TX. (WSAW) - Spencer native Hunter Luepke put out the performance of a lifetime on Saturday, running for three touchdowns while leading North Dakota State to its ninth Football Championship Series championship since 2011 downing Montana State 38-10.

All of Luepke's touchdowns came in the first half in which NDSU raced out to a 28-0 lead. Luepke added 82 yards on the ground. His TD's were

from 8, 11 and 6 yards

"It's fantastic. I mean, we've been working for over a year to achieve this goal after last spring season," Luepke said after the game, "So, to finally accomplish it is amazing. We had to work very hard to do this and I'm just ecstatic that it finally happened."

Luepke was named the game's most outstanding player for his efforts.

North Dakota State isn't an FCS powerhouse. It's **the** FCS powerhouse. And the guy who drove the Bison to their ninth NCAA title in 11 years was a 236-pound fullback.

On Saturday, North Dakota State took advantage of Montana State's awful injury luck to thoroughly mosh the Bobcats 38-10 and end a perilous one-year title drought. The engine behind that win was Hunter Luepke, a former two-star recruit from Spencer, Wisconsin and 2021 first-team All American.

The junior running back set the tone early to send a message to Montana State; we don't care where you are or whether it's even necessary, we're gonna beat the crap out of you.

Sometimes the Xs and Os of college football can be a little overwhelming. Fortunately, I've broken down the play for our convenience here:



As the title to this piece teased, Hunter took the path of most resistance and well...splattered the dude. I'm sure you can find more of Hunter's highlights on You tube, etc.

Luepke, a fullback whose job it is to crash into things chose option B: crash into things.

That was the first of three Luepke touchdowns on the day – all in the first two quarters of the game – and it gave the Bison a lead they wouldn't relinquish. Since his third score didn't involve nearly enough contact, the NDSU star celebrated by kicking himself in the head.

You know, normal fullback stuff.

Unfortunately for the rest of the FCS, Luepke is slated to return to the Bison in 2022. Expect him and the rest of an eternally-stacked North Dakota State roster to start next season as the nation's top-ranked program once again. Story by Christian D' Andrea for USA Today Sports

Well-known for both her English teaching career and theatre legacy, the late Esther Rannow was also one of the LTCA's first volunteers and its House Manager for many years. In celebration of the Tack's 10th Anniversary in 2006-07, Mrs Rannow wrote a series of articles for the TRG's "Backstage at the Tack," in which were shared memories of each of its past ten seasons. The Village Voice is re-publishing these articles to offer the reader a glimpse backward into the Tack's history.

The title of the season brochure for the 2002-2003 season at the LuCille Tack Center for the Arts - Many Patterns/Common Threads - aptly described and defined the artists and performances it included.

For instance, one of the most popular exhibits in the gallery was that of Judith Pentz, "Bed Covers to Art Form." It included articles of clothing, wall hangings and traditional quilts of wonderful patterns. Quilting, once a necessity of life, has indeed become an art form.

On stage at the Tack, the threads reached out in every direction. I must begin with the thread from the north, Lake Superior Big Top Chautauqua. Since I grew up in that area between Washburn and Bayfield, I remember watching the development of this performing venue very closely. I try to attend a performance every time I go "home." Warren Nelson, singer, songwriter, poet and historian, and the Lost Nation String Band take the show out of the canvas tent and put it on the road. The show certainly makes the history of the Apostle Islands come alive.

Moving to the south, where else does one go except Branson? Many of our patrons at the Tack make a yearly pilgrimage to this mecca of country and bluegrass music. For those who can't make the trip, the Tack brought Ozark Jubilee, a cast of singers and musicians who weave together bluegrass, country standards and gospel. Some fine fiddling, as I recall.

Volunteer Sally Racovec said, "I was chairperson of Ozark Jubilee. They were a group right out of Branson. They were a family group and they, indeed, brought the whole family to every concert."

"They had little ones on stage dancing and singing as young as three, and I remember bringing toys for different ages and entertaining them between acts. We were responsible for getting them in their places at certain times so they could perform. We had to have them changed and hair done. The oldest was fourteen, but we had six all under the age of nine. The final stage call had everyone entertaining the audience, even the baby, who obliged by napping until it was time to go on."

In contrast, New West, out of California, stitched together a tribute to the rancher, the vaquero and the men and women of the American West. Their instruments were the mandolin and the acoustic guitar. This show was followed by a chuckwagon dinner in the high school cafeteria.

From the east, well, a little bit east, Our Front Porch Series brought the Richie Yurkovich Band. No explanation needed. If you live in Wisconsin, this group requires no introduction. Accordion, guitar, banjo and percussion provided a lively Sunday afternoon break.

In addition to these "four corners," the season also included Celtic Christmas, Los Llaneros and Sun Ergo's "Twining: Stories and Dances from the Third World." All these performances and performers reached back into heritages as the source of their art - whatever form that art took.

This season reminded me again of how much of who we are begins with our own heritage - or at least our impression of it. The threads of our lives stretch back and create the patterns of our own lives. Once again, the LTCA had provided us a service, as well as wonderful entertainment. Thanks, Tack!


