A small group of local historians are working to bring forth a museum dedicated to the rich history of the Spencer area. Although the efforts are becoming more visible in recent years, the roots of the project date back 40 plus years with a deep history of its own.

going on trying to collect old things and old stories," said Ron Draeger, who heads up the technology side of the future museum. "A lot of that ended up in this collection."

Through the centennial celebration efforts, a history book and commemorative plate were created to raise funds. Those funds were placed into a savings account with the hopes that someday they could do something with a historical museum and it just never evolved," added Chairman Jerry Kobs.

"Originally, 1996-97 I would say, Bettye Nall and Barbara Rux were the two that really spearheaded getting it started, and had a small group of people that met periodically. It lasted maybe 5-10 years, then it kind of dropped by the wayside.

"They had picked up items along the way that people had given them and had continued to store it...

"We picked it up when I got the call to be the chairman – that was in February of 2014."

Kobs spent some time with Nall to get a feel for the project before taking on the chairmanship, then approached seven individuals in the community with longevity and an eagerness to

Well-known for both her English teaching career and theatre legacy, the late Esther Rannow was also one of the LTCA's first volunteers and its House Manager for many years. In celebration of the Tack's 10th Anniversary in 2006-07, Mrs Rannow wrote a series of articles for the TRG's "Backstage at the Tack," in which were shared memories of each of its past ten seasons. The Village Voice is re-publishing these articles to offer the reader a glimpse backward into the Tack's history.

s the seasons at the LuCille Tack Center for the Arts progressed, so did the programming become more challenging and more complex. As Executive Director Deb Janz told me, "I recall the 2000-2001 season as a very busy one."

"The Native American month was a huge project. The gallery displayed wonderful Navajo weavings from a private collection, while on stage Native American music, dance and stories were performed by Echoes of Earth & Sky. In addition to this performance was a poetry reading by Denise Sweet. The thematic approach to the month was entertaining and educational, something for all ages to experience."



Janz added another, more personal, memory of the season. One of the headliners for that year was the legendary Maynard Ferguson. She said that during her college years she attended his concerts in the Milwaukee area "as money and transportation would allow." She said, "And then I had the unique opportunity to engage him for a concert at the LTCA in 2001."

As House Manager at the time, I also recall the Ferguson concert, but for a very different reason. Part of my responsibility was to ensure that the audience was seated by the time the show would begin – promptly at 7:30. At ten minutes after the appointed hour, I went backstage to find out what the hold-up was. Mr. Ferguson was in the restroom. Pre-show jitters was the explanation. It was somewhat reassuring to learn that even the professionals experienced these. Needless to say, it had no effect on a wonderful performance.

You may recall the December performance of Twin Cities Bronze, a handbell ensemble from the Twin Cities area. Diane Veale remembers organizing the handbell workshops that took place during the day of their evening performance. Handbell ringers from six local churches and schools attended sessions led by members of Twin Cities Bronze, and then rehearsed a massed-choir number with the TCB that opened the evening's concert. It was a phenomenal experience for all involved, but a real challenge to pull together almost forty musicians in ringing, performing and eating situations during the holiday season. Fortunately, Tack volunteers were up to that challenge and the day went off without a hitch and was enjoyed by all in attendance.

Another show that required an astonishing effort from both Board and volunteers was the second appearance of the Atomic Tailfins. This time, however, was a far cry from their previous appearance as part of the Front Porch Series. Realizing that this kind of music requires more than a stage, the performance was moved to the high school gym! A sort of retro-sock hop would be the format. As I recall, there was a great deal of hauling, carrying and lifting. But it all came together, and the audience enjoyed a fabulous evening of music and dancing. What fun!

The 2000 – 2001 season was another fine one for the arts at the LTCA – for those of us "backstage" as well as for the enthusiastic audiences!

help with the historical collection. The group formed the Spencer Area Historical Society and obtained permission from the village to use a portion of the Olde Hall complex, which was once used as the village's hall and fire department, for a museum.

The collection will cover the history of four townships – Brighton, Spencer, Sherman, and Unity – as well as the village of Spencer.

While the group has seen a continuing influx of historical items coming in, it continues to search for old scrapbooks, photos, memories, and yearbooks for the area.

The collection features a nearly complete collection of Spencer yearbooks, but the group continues to search for the 1939, 1942, 1943, and 1947 editions.

An opening for the Spencer museum is planned for late summer.


